have been part of our liturgical tradition since the very early Church. Today we are perhaps more familiar with them as the Advent hymn "O Come, O Come, Emmanuel." In the revised liturgy, they are also proposed as verses for the Gospel Acclamation at daily Mass, which is how we will use them this year.

Each of these special prayers highlights a title for the Messiah, and a plea that he come: O Sapientia (O Wisdom), O Adonai (O Lord), O Radix Jesse (O Root of Jesse), O Clavis David (O Key of David), O Oriens (O Rising Sun), O Rex Gentium (O King of the Nations), and O Emmanuel. Each one refers to a prophecy of Isaiah of the coming of the Messiah.

If one starts with the last title and takes the first letter of each one - Emmanuel, Rex, Oriens, Clavis, Radix, Adonai, Sapientia - the Latin words "ERO CRAS" are formed, meaning, "I will be tomorrow." Therefore, the Lord Jesus, whose coming we have prepared for in Advent and whom we have addressed in these seven Messianic titles, now speaks to us, "Tomorrow, I will be with you." So the O Antiphons not only bring intensity to our Advent preparation, but bring it to a joyful conclusion.

SATURDAY

Entrance Antiphon

Christ our King is coming, he is the Lamb foretold by John.

First Reading

Jeremiah 23:5-8: I will raise a virtuous Branch for David.

Response to the Psalm

In his days justice shall flourish and peace till the moon fails.

Gospel Acclamation

O Adonai, Ruler of the House of Israel, who gave the law to Moses on Sinai, come and save us with outstretched arm.

Gospel Reading

Matthew 1:18-24: Jesus is born of Mary who was betrothed to Joseph, son of David.

Communion Antiphon

His name will be called Emmanuel, which means God-with-us.

THE MARIAN ANTHEM (Alma Redemptoris Mater)

Loving mother of the Redeemer, gate of heaven, star of the sea, assist your people who have fallen-yet strive to rise again. To the wonderment of nature you bore your Creator, yet remained a virgin after as before. You who received Gabriel's joyful greeting, have pity on us poor sinners.

THE SCRIPTURES THIS WEEK

(GIL 94) Advent II (17th - 24th December): 'In the last week before Christmas the events that immediately prepared for the Lord's birth are presented from Matthew and Luke. The texts in the first reading, chosen in view of the gospel reading, are from different Old Testament books and include important Messianic prophecies.' (GIL 94)

During Advent and Christmastide we are asked to pray for these intentions: Openness to the Word of God, Migrants and Refugees, Expectant Mothers.

HOLY FATHER'S INTENTIONS (December)

Saint John of the Cross, Priest and Doctor of the Church [COMMEMORATION]

Saint John of the Cross: born in 1542. A Carmelite friar and friend of Saint Teresa of Avila, who encouraged him to work for the reform of the order, which he did despite great suffering. A remarkable poet and mystic, he died in Andalusia in 1591.

Entrance Antiphon

Behold, the Lord will come, and all his holy ones with him; and on that day there will be a great light.

First Reading

Zephaniah 3:1-2.9-13: Messianic salvation is promised to all the poor in spirit.

Response to the Psalm

This poor man called; the Lord heard him.

Gospel Acclamation

Look, the Lord will come to save his people. Blessed those who are ready to meet him.

Gospel Reading

Matthew 21:28-32: John came, but it was the sinners who believed in him.

Communion Antiphon

The Just Judge will bestow a crown of righteousness on those who eagerly await his coming.

WEDNESDAY

Entrance Antiphon

The Lord will come and he will not delay. He will illumine what is hidden in darkness and reveal himself to all the nations.

First Reading

Isaiah 45:6-8.18.21-26: Send victory like a dew, you heavens.

Response to the Psalm

Send victory like a dew, you heavens, and let the clouds rain it down.

Gospel Acclamation

Seek the Lord while he is still to be found, call to him while he is still near.

Gospel Reading

Luke 7:19-23: Go back and tell John what you have seen and heard.

Communion Antiphon

Behold, our Lord will come with power and will enlighten the eyes of his servants.

THURSDAY

Entrance Antiphon

The "O" Antiphons

The "O Antiphons" refer to the seven antiphons that are chanted before the Magnificat during Vespers of the Liturgy of the Hours in the last week before Christmas, December 17-23. The exact origin of the O Antiphons is not known. Boethius (c. 480-524) made a slight reference to them, thereby suggesting their presence at that time. At the Benedictine abbey of Fleury (now Saint-Benoit-sur-Loire), these antiphons were recited by the abbot and other abbey leaders in descending rank, and then a gift was given to each member of the community. By the eighth century, they are in use in the liturgical celebrations in Rome. The usage of the O Antiphons was so prevalent in monasteries that the phrases, "Keep your O" and "The Great O Antiphons" were common parlance. One may thereby conclude that in some fashion the O Antiphons
