of the City of Rome, then deserted and threatened. He is called the "Apostle of England" because it was he who sent Augustine, the prior of Saint Andrew's to minister there, after encountering English slaves in the Forum.

Blessed Gregory, raised upon the throne of Peter, sought always the beauty of the Lord and lived in celebration of that love.

# Weekday or Saint Cuthbert, Bishop or Saturday Mass of Our Lady [OPTIONAL MEMORIAL]

Saint Cuthbert: born about 634, Cuthbert died on Farne (Northumberland) on 20 March 687. By tradition a shepherd boy, he became monk and prior at Melrose. After the Synod of Whitby in 664, he became prior of Lindisfarne, and gradually won over the community to Roman customs. In 676 left the monastery to live in solitude on the island of Inner Farne. For the last two years of his life he served as bishop of Lindisfarne but returned to his island to die. He is remembered as the most popular of the Anglo-Saxon saints of Northern England.

1 Thessalonians ends with thoughts about death and the Second Coming of the Lord. Then we move on to Colossians, a letter which encourages the people who have heard the Good News, and talks about the effects of receiving the faith.

The Gospel moves on to Saint Luke: we are taken right back to the beginning of Jesus' public ministry, as he is rejected in Nazareth, and so moves to Capernaum to begin his work. After working miracles, he calls Peter to follow him and begins to encounter opposition from the Pharisees of the town.

## Weekday or Saints Margaret Clitherow, Anne Line and Margaret Ward, Martyrs

[OPTIONAL MEMORIAL]

Margaret Middleton was born in York in 1556, lived there all her life, and died there on 25 March 1586. At 15 she married a butcher, John Clitherow, and three years later became a Catholic. Imprisoned for her non-attendance at church, she taught herself to read and later ran a small school for her own and neighbour's children. Her husband remained Protestant, but allowed her to hide priests at their house. In 1586 the secret hiding places were discovered, and Margaret was put on trial. She refused to plead, for which the punishment was being crushed to death. Anne Heigham was born at Dunmow (Essex) around 1565, and was hanged at Tyburn on 27 February 1601. In her teens she became a Catholic and was disinherited, and in 1585 married Roger Line, also a disinherited convert, who was subsequently imprisoned and exiled for his faith, leaving her destitute. She taught and embroidered, and also kept house for priests. After a large number of people had been seen gathering at her house for Mass, she was arrested, tried and condemned to death. Margaret Ward was born at Congleton (Cheshire), but entered into the service of a family in London. She was arrested after assisting a priest escape from prison, but refused under severe torture to reveal his hiding place or to renounce her faith. She was tried at the Old Bailey, and executed on this day in 1588.

Saint Edmund Arrowsmith: born in 1585 at Haydock, Edmund was ordained at Douai and began his work in Lancashire Mission, including Salmesbury and Walton-le-Dale; he was amazingly zealous in his work, despite one arrest; eventually arrested in 1628, he was imprisoned and martyred at Lancaster.

On the death of Pope Pelagius II in 590 Gregory was elected Pope, showing marvellous pastoral care in preaching, writing, caring for the poor and working for the civil welfare
