Saint John Henry Newman, Priest [FEAST]

Saint John Henry Newman: He was born in London in 1801 and died in 1890. Educated at Oxford, he was the most notable Catholic convert of the age. He became a member of the Oratory of St Philip Neri, and was made Cardinal by Leo XIII.

Entrance Antiphon

THE MARIAN ANTHEM



THE SCRIPTURES THIS WEEK

This week we spend time with some of the last Old Testament prophets: Jonah, Malachi and Joel; there is a theme of the coming end of time emerging, and the need for repentance.

The Gospel (Luke 10-11) shows Jesus' instruction on prayer and charity: we receive the Our Father and the Parable of the Good Samaritan, as well as other advice on how to live as his followers.

OUR PRAYERS THIS WEEK

During Ordinary Time (Autumn) we are asked to pray for these intentions: Students and Teachers; The Spread of the Gospel; The Harvest; The Fruits of Human Work and the Reverent Use of Creation; Justice and Peace in the World; All Victims of War; Young People; Prisoners and Their Families.

HOLY FATHER'S INTENTIONS (October)

Missionary Disciples: We pray that every baptized person may be engaged in evangelization, available to the mission, by being witnesses of a life that has the flavour of the Gospel.

MONDAY

Saint Francis of Assisi [MEMORIAL]

Saint Francis of Assisi: born in Assisi in 1182, Francis was a light-hearted youth, but changed, giving up his inheritance, offering his whole life to God and embracing poverty. He gathered followers around him, instituting a Rule that was approved by Pope Innocent III. The result was the Franciscan Order, known for preaching and for the love of poverty. Francis died in 1226.

Entrance Antiphon

Francis, the man of God, left his home behind, abandoned his inheritance and became poor and penniless, but the Lord raised him up.

First Reading

Jonah 1:1-2:1.11: Jonah ran away from the Lord.

Response to the Psalm

You lifted my life from the pit, O Lord.

Gospel Acclamation

Your words are spirit, Lord, and they are life: you have the message of eternal life.

Gospel Reading

Luke 10:25-37: Who is my neighbour?

Communion Antiphon

Blessed are the poor in spirit, for theirs is the Kingdom of Heaven.

TUESDAY

Weekday or Saint Faustina Kowalska, Re-

ligious [Optional Memorial]

Saint Faustina: she was born in Poland in 1905. Aged twenty, she entered religious life. For many years, while suffering ill health, she received visions of Jesus as the Divine Mercy. She died in Krakow in 1938.

Entrance Antiphon

Within your will, O Lord, all things are established, and there is none that can resist your will. For you have made all things, the heaven and the earth, and al that is held within the circle of heaven; you are the Lord of all.

First Reading

Jonah 3:1-10: The people of Nineveh renounced their evil behaviour, and God relented.

Responsorial Psalm

If you, O Lord, should mark our guilt, Lord, who would survive?

Gospel Acclamation

I call you friends, says the Lord, because I have made known to you everything I have learnt from my Father.

Gospel Reading

Luke 10:38-42: Martha welcomed Jesus into her house. It is Mary who has chosen the better part.

Communion Antiphon

The Lord is good to those who hope in him, to the soul that seeks him.

WEDNESDAY

Weekday or Saint Bruno, Priest [OPTIONAL MEMORIAL]

Saint Bruno: Born in Cologne in 1035; after teaching theology, he embraced solitude at La Grande Chartreuse, founding the Carthusian Order, following a way of poverty, silence, prayer and penance He died in Calabria in 1101.

Entrance Antiphon

Within your will, O Lord, all things are established, and there is none that can resist your will. For you have made all things, the heaven and the earth, and al that is held within the circle of heaven; you are the Lord of all.

First Reading

Jonah 4:1-11: You are only upset about a castor-oil plant. Am I not to feel sorry for Nineveh, the great city!

Train me, Lord, to observe your law, to keep it with my heart.

Gospel Reading
