Priest [OPTIONAL MEMORIALS]

Saint John de Brebeuf and Saint Isaac Jogues: they were Jesuits who preached the Gospel in North America from 1635. They worked among the Huron and Iroquois but between 1642 and 1649 all were brutally killed.

Saint Paul of the Cross: Paul Danei was born in 1694; he was devoted to the Passion of Our Lord, and set up houses for others to share his work – the Passionist Order. He died in Rome in 1775.
